

NURSERY NEWS

Nursery Report Summer 2024



Catastrophic Loss Due to Cold Snap

Greater Victoria, including the Saanich Peninsula, where the GOMPS nursery is located, experienced a severe cold event in mid-January this year. Nursery volunteers waited until the end of June to count and set aside Garry oak seedlings that did not leaf out. The net result was that we lost 38% of our seedling inventory. The final count was 1,242 dead seedlings.



Are you planning to plant some Garry oak seedlings this year?

We have lots of Garry oak seedlings ready to be planted. Fall is the best time to plant Garry oaks as the Fall and Winter rains assist the root development of young seedlings to enable survival during the following summer drought period on Vancouver Island and the surrounding region. Garry oak trees are slow-growing for the first 3 to 7 years but, once established in the ground, they can grow one to two feet per year after that.

Please note that Garry oak seedling survival is enhanced with the use of stakes, protective caging to prevent browsing/damage, mulching, and supplemental water during drought periods.

Our society grows Garry oak seedlings with a view to restoring and/or infilling existing Garry oak meadows and associated ecosystems. If you have a large Garry oak(s) on your property, have you thought about planting the next generation of Garry oak(s)? Please contact us at grow.oaks@gmail.com for more information.

Rosewall Creek restoration

The Victoria Community Association Network (VCAN) Mapping Project

VCAN has initiated a community mapping project to identify potential priority park acquisitions within the City of Victoria. The project will pinpoint three areas of promise in each neighbourhood to conserve and enhance the Garry oak ecosystem, aligning with the city's vision for a sustainable and vibrant community.

The idea for the mapping project originated during the monthly meetings of VCAN, a collective of representatives from various community associations in the City of Victoria. Our primary objectives are to keep stakeholders informed and educated on matters of common interest, shape public policies at both municipal and regional levels, and occasionally undertake community projects that have a broad impact across the city and region. VCAN comprises 12 distinct neighbourhoods, namely Burnside Gorge, Downtown, Fairfield/Gonzales, Fernwood, Hillside Quadra, James Bay, North Jubilee, South Jubilee, North Park, Oaklands, Rockland, and Victoria West.

VCAN also aims to educate and raise awareness about old growth Garry oak trees found in the urban environment. On July 6th we toured Kings Park (Fernwood), led by GOMPS President Ryan Senechal, an arborist/urban forester.

Kings Park (1150 Caledonia Ave) is home to Garry oak trees that have been preserved since pre-settlement times. These trees have been managed using Indigenous *lə̱kʷəŋən* fire regimes, reflecting a rich cultural history associated with this place. Among the Garry oak trees in the park, one stands at an impressive age of 500 years, while the others range between 175 and 200 years old and qualify as old growth according to provincial definition.

Originally a residential lot with a house, the park was donated by the owner (estate) and transformed into a public space managed by the city. Ten seedlings were planted a decade ago to contribute to the preservation of these trees. Unfortunately, one of the seedlings was vandalized recently.

Securing and preserving more spaces with mature Garry oaks and spaces for urban forest scaffolding like Kings Park is crucial for passing on Indigenous traditions and maintaining a temporal connection for urban youth. It is essential to recognize and prioritize these spaces in urban forestry for their continuation.


The challenge lies in connecting people to this space and others like it, beyond merely focusing on conservation and biodiversity. One idea is to create an elevated and accessible tree platform that protects the roots of the Garry oak trees. Additionally, planting *kwetlal* (camas) and community volunteer opportunities can further engage the community. The presence of black-tailed deer and their contribution to fertilization through their droppings has been a natural process for thousands of years.

Unfortunately, there is a concerning trend of removing these trees without adequate

replacement.

Harewood Plains Update

Nanaimo & Area Land Trust (NALT) continues to collaborate with a working group, including Nature Nanaimo, to protect the unique natural values of the Harewood Plains.

Harewood Plains is located at the south end of the City of Nanaimo. It is bounded by the Nanaimo Parkway to the north, McKeown Way to the east, and Harewood Mines Road to the west, and home to a mixture of critically imperilled ecological communities that includes open Garry oak woodlands and vernal seeps.

Along with other organizations, NALT has sent comments to the City of Nanaimo's Subdivision Approving Officer listing our concerns about the threat that the proposed subdivision and planned development poses to the Plains including to the critical habitat of three endangered plant species present in the area.

On the evening of March 4th, Nanaimo City council passed a motion requesting that the Province of BC and the Federal Government work with rights holders and stake holders to protect the Harewood Plains. Delegations from NALT, Nature Nanaimo and Kiki Nursery spoke in favour of the motion. Councillors received more than 500 messages of support from our community.

The motion also brought the focus of local media to the efforts to protect the Harewood Plains. CHLY Radio, Chek TV and the Nanaimo News Bulletin reported on the motion.

The working group is now working to identify next steps for effective engagement with provincial and federal politicians to further support the City's motion. Stay tuned for more information about how to support this important conservation effort.

LETTER: New strategy fails to address crisis in Saanich parks. Saanich's new Biodiversity Conservation Strategy ignores key recommendations.

The new Biodiversity Conservation Strategy (BCS), recently approved by Saanich council, ignores the comprehensive programs put forward by the Resilient Saanich Technical Committee (RSTC). Council put the RSTC in place to advise on these issues. The RSTC recommended the following comprehensive programs: a private land stewardship program, a species-at-risk management program, new ecosystem mapping to replace inaccurate mapping, and a comprehensive ecosystem restoration program. This last program would include significant access restrictions in Saanich parks to protect special ecosystems. Mapping would include ecological condition assessment, to determine restoration needs for each park.

The GOMPS Volunteer Garry Oak Nursery has been in operation since 2017 to meet the challenge of producing locally sourced Garry oaks. The Nursery project is run by a task force drawn from members of GOMPS and addresses the rapid loss of Greater Victoria, Southeastern Vancouver Island & Gulf Island's native flagship tree - the Garry oak (*Quercus garryana*) - our province's only native oak.

Garry oak ecosystems are among the most endangered ecosystems in Canada with **only 3%** remaining in a natural state. In Canada, they are only found in British Columbia, on the southeastern tip of Vancouver Island, some of the Gulf Islands and a few spots on the mainland. We are looking for more volunteers to help at the nursery. Please connect with us and help grow the oaks!

Garry Oak Tree and Garry Oak Ecosystem Facts

- The *lək'wənən* word for Garry oak ecosystem is *Čaŋēłč* or *Kwetlal*
- The *SENĆOTEN* word for Garry oak is *ĆEN,ITĆ* and pronounced Chung-ae-th-ch
- The *HUL'Q'UMI'NUM* word is *p'hwulhp*
- Garry oak ecosystems were shaped by Indigenous agroecological management over thousands of years.
- This population of oaks connects *lək'wənən* and *WSÁNEĆ* people with their lands, traditions, foods, medicines, cultural practices, and ancestors.
- Of the family *Fagaceae*, and the genus *Quercus*. *Quercus garryana*, was named by Botanist David Douglas in the early 1800's to honor his friend Nicholas Garry, an officer in the Hudson Bay Company.
- Garry oak ecosystems arrived after the glacial retreat approximately 10,000 years ago, and at least 1,645 organisms (plants, insects, amphibians, reptiles, birds, mammals, etc.) have co-evolved with them.
- Garry oak ecosystems in Canada are some of the rarest, and the area they occupy is declining in large part due to development
- The largest urban oak in Victoria is on Falkland Rd. near Beach Dr. in Oak Bay

Territorial Acknowledgement

The GOMPS Volunteer Garry Oak Nursery is located on the traditional territory of the W̱SÁNEĆ people encompassing the five local communities: BOḰEĆEN (Pauquachin), MÁLEXEŁ (Malahat), W̱JOŁEŁP (Tsartlip), W̱SIKEM (Tseycum), and S̱TZAUTW̱ (Tsawout). We acknowledge and thank the W̱SÁNEĆ people on whose traditional territory we live, learn, work, and teach. Our advocacy efforts extend over the Iəkʷənən territory, known today as the Esquimalt (Kosapsom) and Songhees Nations. The W̱SÁNEĆ and Iəkʷənən people have lived and worked on this land since time immemorial and whose historical relationship to the land and territories continues to this day.
